KIDS ON BIKES: Will they STOP?

All bikers – young and old – are reminded that STOP signs mean you need to STOP before proceeding. This is especially important in busy, high traffic areas – including all streets leading to Ruggles Park, the most popular destination for kids on bikes. **Stop means STOP!**

BIKE HELMETS: Does your child wear one? It's the law in Maine.

Maine state law requires a bike helmet for anyone under the age of 16. See the graphics below detailing rules for bicyclists and motorists – prepared by the [Bicycle Coalition of Maine](#).

Rules for Bicyclists

Bicyclists have most of the same rights and responsibilities as drivers of motor vehicles. Riding is more fun and sharing even the busiest roads with motorists is easier when you ride legally, predictably, and safely.

Obey the Rules of the Road

Ride straight and in single file in a predictable manner. Look ahead and allow time to avoid hazards, negotiate with traffic and opening car doors. Yield to pedestrians and obey all traffic signals and signs — it's the law!

Ride with Traffic

Always ride with traffic. Riding against traffic makes bicyclists more prone to crashes with cars. Pass other traffic on the right, if necessary, carefully and at your own risk. When

approaching multi-lane intersections, choose the rightmost lane for the direction you intend to travel.

Be Visible

In most bike-car collisions, drivers insist they did not see the bicyclist, so it pays to be visible. When riding at night, Maine law requires a headlight in front and reflectors on the back and pedal/ankle. The Coalition recommends a flashing taillight and reflective clothing for night riding as well — the brighter the better.

Signal All Turns

Look behind you before lane changes or turns. Signal safely in advance using one of these signals.

Maintain Your Equipment

Give your bike a professional inspection and tune-up regularly. Worn or under-inflated tires, poor brakes, or a faulty drivetrain can be dangerous and make riding less enjoyable.

Wear a Helmet

Helmets are required for bicyclists under 16. For all bicyclists, a helmet is the best protection against head injury in the event of an accident. Your helmet should fit level and snug.

Make Left Turns Safely

Turn left by moving into the left side of the travel lane or left turn lane, or stop, dismount and walk across crosswalks.

Rules for Motorists

Bicyclists have most of the same rights and responsibilities as drivers of motor vehicles. Although bicyclists are less visible, slower, and more vulnerable to injury than motorists, bikes and cars share the road best when bikes are respected as vehicles with equal rights to the road.

Expect Bicyclists on the Road

Look for bicyclists on all types of roads, in all weather, and at any time of day or night. Bicyclists may legally ride anywhere within the travel lane for their own safety on narrow roads or to avoid potholes, debris, opening car doors, or other hazards.

Before opening your car door adjacent to travel lanes, look for approaching bicyclists.

Watch for Children

Children on bicycles are often unpredictable. Expect the unexpected.

Don't Use Your Horn

It's rude and startling. Wait to pass until it's safe to do so.

Pass with Care — Give Bikes 3 Feet

Slow down and wait until it is safe to pass. Give all bicyclists at least 3 feet of clearance when passing — it's the law. Be sure you've safely cleared the bicyclist before returning to the lane.

Use Extra Caution in Bad Conditions

In bad weather, give bicyclists extra trailing and passing room. When uncertain in any situation, slow down until it's safe to proceed.

Be Careful at Intersections

Assume bicyclists are traveling through intersections unless they signal otherwise, and yield to them as you would to any other slow-moving vehicle. Do not turn left or right in front of bicyclists unless you can do so safely. It's the law.

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PARKING IN BAYSIDE: The Parking Ordinance is summarized below. ONE HINT: No parking near intersections. [Learn more here.](#)



BAYSIDE PARKING AT A GLANCE

SAFETY FIRST: Emergency vehicles require a 14' passageway on all roads. Always park as far off of roadways as possible. Many front and side yards are part of roadway-parking; parking with wheels on grass is OK.

WHERE YOU CAN PARK

- At your residence: If your "yard" is on the roadway per the Greenlaw (Campground) map, it is available for public parking.
- Ruggles Park Area: See Diagram. No overnight parking except at base of park across from kayak storage area, where there is a 48-hour limit.
- Merithew Square: Overnight parking allowed.
- Long-Term Parking: Cradle Park (also known as Cradle Row and Grove Street): Vehicles up to 19 feet long may be parked in this area between July 1 and Labor Day for a maximum of 14 days. Owner's name and phone number must be clearly visible.
- Bayside streets except where prohibited. NOTE: A 14-foot vehicle passageway must be maintained at all times.
- Handicap Parking: Available at Ruggles Park and Community Hall.

NO PARKING AREAS

- In front of any public or private driveway (whether or not the driveway is occupied), or mailboxes.
- Within 15 feet of an intersection (that is where any two roads come together).
- Within 15 feet of a fire hydrant on the hydrant side of the street
- Signed "No Parking" zones.
- Fire Department Area: Within 15 feet of the Fire Department driveway, on both sides of the street.
- Ruggles Park: See Diagram.
- Auditorium Park: Only available to residents on the Park.
- George Street: No parking on the Community Hall side between Rogers Lane and Cobe Road.
- Rogers Lane: No parking on the Bayview Park side.
- Lower Bayview Park: No parking on either side (except for unloading/loading with a 15-minute maximum).
- Bay Street and Sea Street: No parking on Blaisdell Park side.
- Shore Road at Kelly Cove: No parking on the inland side across the street from the parking area just north of the bridge.
- Motorhomes: No overnight parking in any Village parking area or along Village roads.

Violations: May result in fines of \$25 to \$200 per day.

RUGGLES PARK

Parking area is designated by blue oval. No parking area is designated with a red X.

NOTE: Under no circumstance should a Vehicle be parked on a roadway in any manner that results in the area of passage being less than fourteen (14) feet.
